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906 (269F; 637M) farmers received a second input pack. A total of 29.97MT of basal fertilizer, 93.38MT of top dressing fertilizer, 5.43MT of bio-fortified orange maize, 4.31MT of white maize and 16.42MT of biofortified NUA 45 sugar beans were distributed in all the targeted irrigation schemes. 1,138 farmers trained on crop production, pest management, and crop post harvest management, good agricultural practices, climate smart agricultural approaches application (Phase II). Weekly dipping resumed due to the onset of rains which usually result in high cattle tick infestation.

2000 farmers (37% women) received fodder crops. 800MT of cattle survival stockfeed was distributed in 4 districts to 1443 households for supplementary feeding of cattle

The designs for 2 schemes (Chipendeke, Kushinga) were submitted for review. 181 labourers were employed in labour intensive activities in four schemes and provided 15,060 labour hours.

HEALTH AND WASH





396,782 people were reached with basic health services and support in November. 397,064 people received community sensitisation on health promotion interventions. The draft designs for an Isolation ward at St. Peter's Mission Hospital were completed in November and are now being reviewed through

110 new households now access to adequate sanitation facilities.



67 water points,(53 boreholes in 5 districts, 8 springs in 1 district, 5 deep wells in 3 districts and one piped water scheme) were rehabilitated



Community health clubs in Gutu planning to produce face masks and menstrual hygiene management materials for pupils to establish hygiene enabling facilities. 8 communities in Gutu and Chimanimani were trained on Drinking Water Safety and Security Planning (DWSSP). Development of DWSSP plans have commenced.









Distribution of education supplies is near completion. Phase 2 of the intervention will entail monitoring of utilisation of the school materials. A RapidPro survey template was developed and shared with MoPSE for approval. The tool will be used to monitor schools receiving teaching and learning materials. A communication whatsapp platform with all DSIs for the ZIRP benefiting schools was created for correspondence purposes.



247 School-in-a-box kits and 15 classroom tents reserved for schools where new classroom blocks will be constructed

CROSS CUTTING ELEMENTS



Displacement Tracking Matrix (DTM) baseline assessment conducted in 12 districts of Manicaland and Masvingo Provinces. The main objective of the survey was to present a descriptive analysis through province and district profiles and summary statistics on sector-wide needs.

19,516 IDPs from 4,712 households participated in the DTM assessment



60 Enumerators were engaged targeting 211 wards, 210 wards were covered





CROSS CUTTING ELEMENTS





UNFPA implementing partner Musasa Project has successfully engaged staff to be based in the districts. Mobile OSC services have started in collaboration with WHO. 221 Gender Based Violence (GBV) survivors have been referred for services by community cadres



268 survivors reached through mobile OSC

55 survivors provided with transport to higher levels of care





13 health workers trained on management of Sexual and Gender Based Violence patients

CROSS CUTTING ELEMENTS



Designs for 5 roads identified (Tarka, Tiya, Manase, Outward Bound, Kushinga roads) are under review with UNOPS HQ. Furthermore, a ToR has been developed for the procurement of a design firm that will develop designs for the 2 bridges.

Construction on 4 roads is ongoing (Ruwedza, Nyamusundu, Gumira, Nyunga).





219 workers have been employed on those roads so far, providing 15,106 labour hours.



COVID-19 RESPONSE ACTIVITIES



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In response to COVID-19, the following interventions were supported through ZIRP, under various targeted sectors.

590,594 people have been reached with messaging done through campaigns during Global Hand washing day, 132 community health clubs, 4 school health clubs and campaigns by village health workers and community health volunteers.



Recruitment of the peer supervisors for VHWs and orientation on their roles was completed in all the districts.

688,200 Masks (3-ply) were delivered in November.



20 Health workers recruited as surge team to support COVID-19 response activities at district level. Production and printing of IEC materials, information kits for VHWs guideline, VHW training manuals now complete
